- Love is what's in the room with you at Christmas if you stop opening presents and listen.
- Love is what makes you smile when you're tired.
- When my grandmother got arthritis, she couldn't bend over and paint her toenails anymore. So my grandfather does it for her all the time, even when his hands got arthritis too. That's love.
- When you tell someone something bad about yourself and you're scared they won't love you anymore. But then you get surprised because not only do they still love you, they love you even more.
- Love is when mommy sees daddy smelly and sweaty and still says he is handsomer than Denzel Washington.
- Love is when your puppy licks your face even after you left him alone all day.

And my personal favorite:

• When you love somebody, your eyelashes go up and down and little stars come out of you.

Anytime I think about love and whether I truly understand it or not, I think of a movie called *Anchorman*. In *Anchorman* there is a character named Brick Tamland, played by Steve Carell. Without giving away too much of the

movie, I'll just say that Brick is a few bricks short of a load. Most of the things that he says in the movie don't make sense. Brick is part of a news reporting team and in one scene, the news crew is sitting around in the office talking about love. Have you ever wondered if we're missing it? It's crazy, if you think about it. The God of the universe – the Creator of nitrogen and pine needles, galaxies and E-minor – loves us with a radical, unconditional, self-sacrificing love. And what is our typical response? We go to church, sing songs, put a few bucks in the offering plate, and try not to cuss.

Whether we've verbalized it yet or not...we all know something's wrong. Something deep inside of our hearts longs to break free from the status quo.
